BEATRICE ★★ In creating Beatrice, writer-director Bertrand Tavernier set out to demythologize the Middle Ages. He succeeds all too well with this repulsive, nightmarish movie in which the angelic title character (Julie Delpy) is raped and tortured by the demented father (Bernard Pierre Donnadieu) she once idolized. BEAU PERE \*\*\* Patrick Dewaere stars again for French director Betrand Blier (Get Out Your Handkerchiefs) in this film, about a stepfather who falls in love with his adopted pubescent daughter. It could have been shocking—or just plain perverse. But Beau Pere is a bittersweet, thoroughly charming motion picture. In French with English subtitles. BEAUTY AND THE BEAST (1946) \*\*\*\*
This French classic goes far beyond mere retelling of the well-known fairy tale. Its eerie visual beauty and surrealistic atmosphere mark it as a genuine original. The tragic love story between Beauty (Josette Day) and the all-too-human Beast (Jean Marais) resembles a moving painting. In French with English subtitles. B&W; 90m. DIR: Jean Cocteau. BED AND SOFA \*\*\* During a housing shortage in Moscow a construction worker takes in an old friend. In the ensuing ménage à trois the worker's wife, now pregnant, turns her back on both the men in her life and leaves to make a new life for herself. A startling achievement, without precedent in the Soviet cinema. Silent. B&W; 73m. DIR: Abram Room. CAST: Nikolai Batalov. Vladimir Fogel. 1927

BEFORE THE RAIN \*\*\*/2 Macedonian filmmaker Milcho Manchevski tells a three-part story about the tragic, far-reaching effects of ancient blood feuds and modern-day civil strife in the remnants of Yugoslavia. The film's circular plot has an intriguing touch of surrealism, is riveting, and is compellingly told. The central section, set in London, is in English; the other two are in Macedonian and Albanian, with English subtitles. Not rated; contains violence, nudity, and mild profanity. 110m. BEFORE THE REVOLUTION ★★☆ Bernardo Bertolucci made this political drama at the age of twenty-two. The plot evolves around a young man who flirts with communism, while en-

CAST: Adriana Asti, Francesco Barilli. 1962 BEING AT HOME WITH CLAUDE \*\*\* Complex, provocative study of the human psyche examines the murder of a young student, and the enigmatic male prostitute who confesses to the crime. During an intense interrogation, the truth about the shocking crime comes out, but not before we're subjected to a harrowing barrage of verbal abuse. In French with English subtitles. BELLE EPOQUE \*\*\* An army deserter hiding out in the Spanish countryside of the 1930s becomes infatuated, one by one, with the four beautiful daughters of a crusty old artist. This eccentric, beautifully photographed movie won the 1993 Oscar for best foreign film. Delightfully ribald, strongly recommended for mature audiences only. In Spanish with English subtitles. BELLISSIMA \*\* Luchino Visconti is known for such pioneering works as Rocco and His Brothers, The Damned, and Death in Venice. As for Bellissima, if you are programming an Anna Magnani festival, you might be interested in this oddly and determinedly lightweight comedy. BERLIN ALEXANDERPLATZ \*\*\* Remember the scene in A Clockwork Orange in which Malcolm McDowell's eyes are wired open and he is forced to watch movies? That's how we often felt when wading through the fifteen-anda-half hours of Rainer Werner Fassbinder's magnum opus, Berlin Alexanderplatz. Not that this much-praised German television production doesn't have its moments of interest, and yes, even genius. But as with all of Fassbinder's films, Berlin Alexanderplatz also has its excesses and false notes. In German with English subtitles. Unrated. 930m. DIR: Rainer Werner Fassbinder.
